Fix It Till Ya Break It by Alan Pedersen

In this time of self-quarantine, I decided to do some preventative maintenance on my 29 Briggs Fordor. Knowing of Jim Morley's breakdown in Amana, IA when his clutch release shaft arm broke, and finding that others have replaced theirs and found them to be cracked, I thought fix it (mine) before it breaks. Having the car on jack stands for the winter made access to the shaft arm easy. Getting everything disconnected was a snap. All I have to do now is pound out the pin, remove the old arm, install new arm and pin, connect, adjust and job finished. Ha! I pounded on that pin, heated it, drilled it and pounded it some more...and then it happened "tink-tink"....a sound you do not want to hear! Something just fell INSIDE the bell-housing! I wiggled the arm and shaft, I turned the shaft 360! It should not do that! I pulled the arm and shaft out toward the outside of the car, and with another "clunk" the shaft was in my hand! That meant there was a pin and throw out bearing fork lying on the inside bottom of my bell-housing...OH CRAP! How do I fix this? Pull the engine and transmission. So parts start coming off my car and single handed I pulled my engine and transmission from the car. I removed the transmission and bell-housing from the engine and found my parts lying at the bottom of the housing. I guess this would be a good time to see if I can locate my mystery oil leak so engine disassembly started. Mystery solved...whoever worked on the engine last did not install a gasket between the engine and flywheel housing; you know the gasket that seals the rear engine block cam hole. No wonder I was marking my territory! So the plan now is to clean and paint the engine compartment, install float-a-motors and my spare engine and transmission, which will put me back on the road. Then I'll go through my original to the car engine and try to make it oil leak free, smooth running, rebuild the bell-housing and clutch, pull the spare and reinstall the original engine in the car. Following Paul Donley's teachings of 'Fix it, fix it, fix it until you really break it', and then really fix it. I guess I'm a star student. What about that stuck shaft arm pin you ask? I won!! I got it out but destroyed the shaft in the process! Guess I showed it who not to mess with! Oh well it was worn anyway LOL


So what have you been up to during these strange times?

Out of Bread? Try Making Your Own! No Knead Bread Recipe

You'll need a 4 or 5-quart Dutch oven with an oven-safe handle. I recommend an oven thermometer to make sure your oven is hot enough and a pair of oven gloves are advisable. You will also need some parchment paper and a kitchen towel.

(Overnight method - simply switch to COOL water & let dough rest overnight on the counter top for 8 to 24 hours).



ALWAYS AERATE (not sift) YOUR FLOUR BEFORE MEASURING!

This recipe is from Jenny Jones (You Tube: Jenny Can Cook – great video to watch!)

Prep Time: 5 minutes Cook Time: 40 minutes Total Time: 4 hours, 25 minutes Makes: One loaf

Ingredients:

- 3 cups (12 3/4 ounces) all-purpose or bread flour (aerate flour before measuring)
- 1/4 teaspoon yeast, active dry or instant
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups hot water, not boiling I use hot tap water about 125-130° F
- (about 2 Tablespoon's extra flour for shaping)

Instructions:

- 1. Combine flour, yeast and salt in a large bowl. Stir in water until it's well combined.
- 2. Cover with plastic wrap and let stand at room temperature for 3 hours.
- 3. After 3 hours dough will become puffy and dotted with bubbles. Transfer it to a well-floured surface and sprinkle dough with a little flour. Using a scraper, fold dough over 10-12 times & shape into a rough ball.
- 4. Place in a parchment paper-lined bowl (not wax paper) and cover with a towel. Let stand on counter top for about 35 minutes.
- 5. Meantime place Dutch oven with lid in a cold oven and preheat to 450° F.
- 6. When oven reaches 450° carefully, using oven gloves, lift the parchment paper and dough from the bowl and place gently into the hot pot. (parchment paper goes in the pot too) Cover and bake for 30 minutes.
- 7. After 30 minutes, remove lid and parchment paper. Return, uncovered, to oven and bake 10 15 more minutes. Let it cool at least 15 minutes before slicing.

Crunchy Coffee Cake

A delicious chocolate chip coffee cake with a yummy crunchy streusel topping. Cook Time 40 minutes Total Time 50 minutes Servings - 10 slices

Ingredients

- 2 cups cake flour
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- pinch salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/3 cup butter
- 1 cup milk
- 2 eggs

Topping

- 3/4 cup light brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1 cup mini or reg. chocolate chips

Instructions

Grease and flour a 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ " bundt pan. Pre heat oven to 350°. Using a small bowl, make the topping first, combine brown sugar and flour, cut in butter to resemble small crumbs and add chocolate chips. Combine and sift together first 5 ingredients, Add butter and milk and beat on low until ingredients are combined then on medium speed for 1 1/2 minutes, add eggs and beat another 1 1/2 minutes. Pour 1/2 the batter into a prepared cake pan, sprinkle with 1/2 the topping, cover with the remaining batter and top with remaining topping. Bake for approximately 35 - 40 minutes. Can be served warm!

<u>Peanut Butter Brownie Pizza</u>

Ingredients

 package Krusteaz Fudge Brownie Mix Peanut Butter Topping:
 cup peanut butter
 (14 oz) can sweetened condensed milk
 cup milk chocolate chips
 cup candy coated chocolate pieces.



Preheat oven to 350°F. Prepare brownie mix as directed. Spoon batter into lightly greased, 12"pizza pan. Bake 23-27 minutes. For Peanut Butter Topping: Place peanut butter and sweetened condensed milk in medium saucepan. Stir over low heat until mixture is smooth. Spread over prepared brownie pizza. Melt chocolate chips and drizzle over peanut butter topping layer. Top with candy coated chocolate pieces.



A Travelling Car Show? Give us your thoughts!


Hi All,
